

## Alum Teamwork Creates Entrepreneurial Success

When the Wedding children were growing up, their parents encouraged them to go into engineering. **Carol Ann '82, Vicki (Wedding) Kurtz '85, Dan, and Don** followed their advice and earned their engineering degrees. They even encouraged Dan's wife, **Tricia (Shock),** a 1988 NDA graduate, to become an engineer as well.

Their parents also urged them to embrace their entrepreneurial spirits. Carol Ann, Vicki, Dan, and Tricia operate Imaging Systems Technology (IST). The company created the first large touch screen in 1997 for a 42-inch plasma display and today is a world leader in large area touch screens as well as providing leading edge engineering design and contract research.

Recently, IST celebrated its 50th patent – a major milestone for any firm. This was accomplished in less than 15 years.

Each principal plays a vital role in the company's success. Carol is president and directs the research and development (R&D). Carol's name is on the majority of the patents. Tricia is the patent manager and their Intellectual Property coordinator. Vicki uses her MBA to manage the business and financial aspects of the company and to get the "product out the door." Dan is in charge of the facilities, crucial when you have research and development labs.

If working all day together isn't enough "family" time, all four company principals live in the same neighborhood. They ride to work together and carpool children to St. John's Jesuit and Notre Dame Academy. It's one of the advantages of working together as a family explained Vicki. "It's nice to work together so we can lean on each other for different things."

Carol applauds her alma mater for adding an engineering class. According to Carol, women have all the skills to be successful engineers and managers. "Women excel in teamwork. They work so much better in groups. Women are better communicators." Her engineering background allows her to help her engineering R&D team

explain their ideas and concepts and enables her to solicit information from them.

The ability to work in teams and communicate gives women a competitive edge in the engineering field in moving up the corporate ladder. "Men often see problems as being linear. Women can look at things circuitously and often come up with some interesting results."

Each values her NDA education in her own way. Tricia developed her love of science and math from teachers like Sr. Irene, Mrs. Joan Funk, and Dr. Christine Manzey. She was one of the first girls to earn five science credits in high school.

Vicki treasures the relationships she developed. She is friends with around 15 classmates and they actively do things together. She still has a stack of notes she passed around in high school.

Carol appreciates the critical thinking skills from English classes that taught her to be open-minded to new ideas and approaches.

All believe that NDA gave them a strong foundation for college and engineering. Plus, they value the single-sex environment. "The all-girl environment built confidence in what I was doing and to excel at it," said Tricia.

For Vicki, sending her daughter to Notre Dame Junior Academy was a "no brainer." **Katie '15** was able to take high school level classes as an eighth grader. She also was surrounded with girls who were like-minded thinkers such as working toward IB (sic International Baccalaureate), she explained. The choice for high school was Katie's and she chose her mother's alma mater.

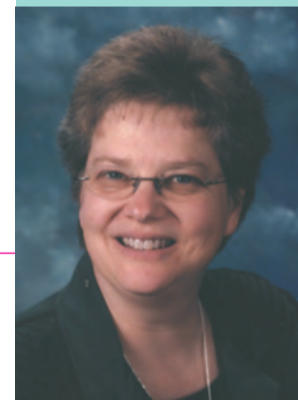
For Tricia, she appreciates the way the Junior Academy teaches girls to love learning. Her daughter **Carol Ann '17,** a seventh grader, is a cellist in the orchestra. "I love that she is with high school girls, she can learn from them."

Just like their parents "encouraged them" they are gently nudging their children as well. They think Katie would make a future patent attorney and Carol Ann a cello-playing engineer.

Meanwhile these three successful women entrepreneurs are looking toward the future. They have a second company, Deep Springs Technology, that fabricates hollow spheres for armor systems, buoyancy, and aerospace applications.

Each is an entrepreneur with her own keen business ability, making a name for their companies globally in technology developments crucial to the 21st century.

## Notre Dame Tackles Today's Hot Topics

As a leader in women's education, Notre Dame Academy takes its role beyond the high school doors out into the community.

One of the ways, the school accomplishes this is through a speaker series open to the public. The latest speaker, Allyson Bowen, focused on cyber bullying.

"For the past several years we have tackled the 'hot' teen and tween topics through our professional speaker series," said Judy Cousino, dean of students.

Speakers have included Rosalind Wiseman, author of *Queen Bees and Wannabes*, Jodee Blanco, author of *Please Stop Laughing at Me* and *Please Stop Laughing at Us*, and Jason Evert, author of *Raising Pure Teens*.

"We've opened our speaker sessions to our own families as well as the Toledo area community. In fact, with Jodee Blanco we offered an afterschool teacher presentation and invited all Catholic, public, and private school teachers, almost 200 teachers participated. Often, we see alum faces at these events," she explained.

"It has always been our mission as an education leader to not shy away from the relevant issues. We bring in the best speakers to address the girls and generally have an open community session as well. The parent session always provides crucial information," she said.

Ms. Bowen, counselor, speaker, and author of *Living Out Loud: Today's Girls and Technology* and *Mean Girls: 101 Creative Strategies and Activities for Working with Relational Aggression*, kicked off the 2011-12 school year.

She was extremely informative discussing cyber-world language, tips on staying techno-savvy, and insights into girl world dynamics and relationships.

"Girls are about twice as likely as boys to be victims and perpetrators of cyber bullying," explained Ms. Bowen. She gave adults key tips (see below).

"When you are the community's educational leader you have a responsibility to raise the visibility on topics impacting women, help girls and women navigate positive change, encourage peer-to-peer networking, and inspire educational change and personal growth," explained Ms. Cousino.

- ☆ Learn to Talk, Text, or Tweet with your child.
- ☆ Do not judge what you hear.
- ☆ Listen and you may learn.
- ☆ Become electronically savvy.
- ☆ Create family computer and cell phone rules.
- ☆ Discuss an "open check" policy.
- ☆ DO NOT allow computers in isolated areas.
- ☆ Understand blocking filters and software.
- ☆ Be a good role model.
- ☆ Talk about all roles in the real world and cyber world (*Target, Bystander, and Bully/Mean Girl*).
- ☆ Contact law enforcement, if necessary.
- ☆ Seek professional help, if necessary.

## High School Experiences Lead to International Adventures

Two Class of 2007 graduates, **Sarah Schill** and **Danielle Bishop**, are on international adventures thanks to Fulbright Scholarships and their Notre Dame Academy preparation. Both will be teaching assistants, Sarah in Germany and Danielle in Spain, as well as having the opportunity to further their studies.

Sarah took German all four years at NDA, and went on a two-week trip to Germany with German Club in which, she says, "...everything I had learned came to life." She continued to study German during her time at Miami University. "I quickly understood how much NDA had prepared me when I took the Language Placement Test and tested immediately into advanced German language courses," stated Sarah.

Sarah is teaching at a German middle school in southwest Germany. The town she is staying in has a university, and she plans to take French courses there. She also plans to join the community tennis club. Sarah studied abroad

in Luxembourg in college, and she plans to make a trip back to spend some time with her host family.

"I got a great base for Spanish-language learning at NDA, and ended up testing into the highest level literature classes in Spanish in college...this influenced my decision to continue studying Spanish, and to add it as a part of my double major," shared Danielle. "Taking advanced courses and studying material hands-on was such an amazing experience, especially because I already had a base in basic language acquisition from NDA. Some great teachers helped me build a really strong base that carried through into my academic interests," she added.

Danielle is currently working at a school called IES Valle de Camargo in the Cantabria region of Spain. She will spend time implementing the UN's Global Classrooms program, which results in a Model UN Conference for the students. She will also work with the Fundacion Marcelino Botin, which sponsors a Responsible Education program –

educating students holistically and teaching them life skills to keep them from developing high risk behaviors.

Danielle also plans to teach children a skill she learned while at NDA. "There are very few women's teams in Cantabria...I learned how to row in high school, and enjoyed an incredibly enriching and successful 4 years of rowing for NDA. We worked hard, had a ton of fun, made great friends, bonded with our amazing coach and went to Nationals every year," said Danielle. "Rowing taught me invaluable skills, like self-discipline, perseverance and truly caring for and working well with others. I'd love to give other girls the same chance to be active and develop great personal goals and interpersonal relationships at a highly important time in their personal development."

The Women of Vision Award is bestowed upon deserving graduates who have made outstanding contributions to their professions, churches, to society and to the growth of the NDA community through loyal support and service. **Dr. Mary Pat Borgess '69** and **Darrah Carr Byrne '92** received the Professional Achievement Award, **Sr. Mary Vivette Baker '60** received the Christian Service Award and **Sr. Mary Charleen Hug '58** received the Notre Dame Academy Community Award.

**Dr. Mary Pat Borgess '69** exemplifies the excellence and values that are encouraged at NDA. She has compassionately continued to make progress in helping women cope with health issues as a healthcare professional. Mary Pat earned her undergraduate degree at the University of Toledo and attended medical school at The Ohio State University College of Medicine.

She is a radiologist and director of breast imaging at Riverside Methodist Hospital in Columbus, Ohio and also works as a clinical assistant professor at The Ohio State University College of Medicine. She specializes in breast health and provides care at a free clinic to women in need of second breast x-ray opinions.

**Darrah Carr Byrne '92** is a business owner, professional dancer, writer and journalist. She is the Artistic Director and Choreographer of her own Irish Dance company in New York, Darrah Carr Dance.

Darrah's trademark dance style, MODERIN, combines traditional Irish step with contemporary modern dance. She has performed on *The Today Show*, and on stages across North America, Europe, and Asia – most notably, Carnegie Hall. Darrah has written for numerous dance publications and is a sought after lecturer on Irish dance. She was named one of the Most Influential Women of 2010 and Top 40 under 40 by the Irish press.

**Sr. Mary Vivette Baker '60** demonstrates the strong Christian values emphasized at NDA. Sr. Vivette served for over 25 years in Papua, New Guinea at the Notre Dame Secondary Girl's Boarding School, where young women with little or no money are able to become educated, productive members of their community.

Sr. Vivette's unwavering faith is a motivation to others to serve God in their own, unique way. She was a teacher in the Toledo area, including NDA, for sixteen years before starting her service in Papua, New Guinea. She has been a Sister of Notre Dame for almost 50 years.

**Sr. Mary Charleen Hug '58** is known for her loving and compassionate spirit. She gives back to the Notre Dame community in many ways as a teacher, writer and friend.

Sr. Charleen is a true woman of prayer – she teaches Prayer at NDA, a class that she designed. She has contributed to *Living Faith*, a national Catholic prayer booklet, since 1986, and has received cards and letters from across the country by people who have been touched by her words. Most notably, Sr. Charleen wrote the Notre

### Bequest establishes Dr. Marian Rejent '38 Endowed Scholarship



Notre Dame Academy is known for its proud tradition of women in medicine, engineering, and technology. Now one of the founders of that tradition, **Dr. Marian Rejent '38**, is creating tomorrow's global students of science with an endowed scholarship.

"In the years to come there will be young women who demonstrate an aptitude for, and interest in, the pure or applied sciences who will benefit from the thoughtfulness of Dr. Rejent," explained Michael Downing, Vice President for Advancement.

Dr. Rejent, an NDA Hall of Fame honoree, was one of four women graduating from Marquette University medical school in 1946. This started a distinguished career that expanded beyond her private practice. Dr. Rejent was appointed by Gov. James Rhodes as medical director of Ohio's Bureau of Crippled Children's Services. Later she moved to Wake County, NC to become its Director of Children's Services and Maternal Care. She finished her career at Toledo's Mercy St. Vincent's before retiring at age 79.

When she was just a sophomore at Notre Dame Academy, Dr. Rejent became interested in medicine. Though supportive of her quest for an education, her family could not afford to send her to college. So after graduation, she worked for two years to save for college. Learning that Dr. Rejent would have to postpone college, Sr. Florence, one of her NDA teachers, called the librarian at Mary Manse College for a list of books to help her keep abreast of the other students. Dr. Rejent completed college and medical school in just six years.

Dr. Rejent, besides her interest in promoting young women in science-related fields, was concerned that children from low to medium income families would not be able to attend Notre Dame Academy. Thus, she established a scholarship to help pave the way.

"Her love of science and her example of perseverance and dedication will live on through the young women who are the recipients of the Dr. Marian Rejent Endowed Scholarship," said Mr. Downing, vice president for Advancement. "The beauty of an endowed scholarship is that it allows Dr. Rejent to continue to touch the lives of young women now and into the future, just as she touched the lives of so many who were in her care as a physician and administrator."

### Special \$25,000 Gift Means New Curtains in the Bova Family Performing Arts Center

Now a "curtain call" will be worthy of our student thespians thanks to a gift by a generous donor. New curtains are being installed in the Ave Maria Performing Arts Center (PAC), one of the most prestigious area theatres with its state-of-the-art technology.

Affectionately known as "The PAC," it has made possible such memorable productions as *Annie*, *Wizard of OZ*, *Annie Get Your Gun*, *Fiddler on the Roof*, *Hairspray*, and one of the earliest high school performances of *Dead Man Walking* and many, many more theatre events.

Despite having a state-of-the-art facility with beautiful remodeled seating for 800+, the main stage curtains, original to the building, were untouched.

Until now! A gift of \$25,000 from a generous donor will replace the curtains making the theatre worthy of the area's top performing arts program. In fact the caliber of our program is receiving global recognition. Notre Dame Academy was asked to perform the summer of 2012 in the Edinburgh Fringe Festival, the world's largest and most prestigious arts festival as part of the American High School Theatre Festival.

"This blessed donor was interested in helping the school fill a pressing need. The PAC is heavily used by our students. Our young women take great pride in their productions, and I think our benefactress saw her gift as one that would touch hundreds of young women for literally decades to come," said Sr. Mary Ann Culpert, President.
